

Plant survey
Bradlaugh Fields
Northampton
May & June 2022

Site description

Three areas previously either ponds or areas of wet grassland were surveyed in May and June 2017. Areas 1 and 2 were surveyed again in May and June 2018, 2019, 2020, 2021 and 2022. Plant species observed were recorded plus any other species present were noted. The three areas are now dry. This has been the case for the last several years since Anglian Water repaired a leak nearby. It is presumed that these areas will remain dry in the future, and this was the sixth year the study was conducted so future management could be agreed. Two surveys were carried out this year. This year has been very dry, so some species seem to have been badly affected by this.

Area 1

Small area which formally was a pond just to the north of the main building. Was cleared of vegetation (including scrub) in the winters of 2016/7, 2017/8, 2018/9, 2019/2020, 2020/21 and 2021/22. This has been colonised by a range of wildflowers and grasses.

Area 2

Area formally a pond with ditch area to the south of the main building. Was cleared of vegetation in winters of 2016/7, 2017/8, 2018/9, 2019/2020, 2020/21 and 2021/22. Edges of the pond and ditch were colonised by wildflowers, while the central section is more nutrient rich and is dominated by grasses and nettles. Some of soil was removed from this centre section over the winters of 2020/21 and 2021/22.

Area 3

Area formally a pond with wet grassland. To the south of the main building and within 50m of Area 2. Overgrown with grasses and scrub species. No management work carried out on this site for several years. A full survey of this area was not carried out but several interesting species were noted in 2017 such as: Pignut, meadow buttercup, Cuckoo flower, Garlic mustard and Gorse.

Area 1 survey

Sweet vernal grass was not seen again this year. Several new species were recorded for the first time but none were indicator species.

Area 2 Survey

Hedge woundwort, Ragged Robin and Velvet brome were not recorded this year. Four new species were recorded for the first time. Several Ringlet, Meadow brown, Marbled white and Common blue butterflies were seen in this area as well as larvae of the 6 spot burnet moth.

Suggested Management

The management for areas 1 & 2 is to cut and clear all the vegetation in late autumn each year. This will slowly reduce any nutrient levels and encourage wildflowers to spread. The central area of 2 could be cleared of the top layer of soil which is nutrient rich. Cuttings from the banks should be spread on the lower area once it has been cut and cleared. Area 1 has a problem with creeping thistle which needs to be dealt with before the main cut back (AM already informed).

Area 3 needs a lot more work and it is suggested that it should be kept short for at least 12 months using a cut and collect mower. After that it may need extra cuts each year or can move to one late cut and collect each year.
